#### Soroptimist International of Sacramento A Happy and Proud Club. Part #1

We were chartered in March, 1923 and we have been going strong ever since. We were the 5<sup>th</sup> club to be established in the world, preceded only by Oakland, San Francisco, Los Angeles, and Washington D.C. Now, we are the 4<sup>th</sup> oldest **surviving** club in the world.

Through the decades, we have constantly contributed to improve the lives of women and children, in this community.

In the very early years, we funded milk stations for the needy, funded services for tuberculosis patients, and for a lighter touch we purchased musical instruments for the Lincoln school orchestra.

During the World War II years, we assisted the American Red Cross, and the U.S.O. We bought War Bonds in excess of \$30,000. We furnished a rest and recreation room at McClellan Air force Base for the WACS, the woman's arm of the Air Force. During those years, we also donated to Fairhaven Home for unwed mothers, funded a psychiatrist at Sacramento Children's Receiving Home, and purchased a station wagon for the Easter Seal Society.

In the 50's and 60's, we funded another station wagon for Easter Seals, we bought a state of the art resuscitator for the Fire Dept., contributed funds for Fairy Tale town, The Pirate Ship; and helped fund KVIE Channel 6 getting started. We also got very involved with the Camellia Festival and started Camellia Cheer up day at nursing homes. More musical instruments were provided to Lincoln School.

In the 60's & 70's, SIS had grown to be the largest club in the world with 150 members. We wish we were there now!!!! We funded heart research at Sutter Memorial Hospital, we hosted Foreign Exchange Students, we provided the funds to build the Old School House Museum in Old Sacramento; we

helped fund the Aquarian Effort for drug rehabilitation; we shipped 9,000 pounds of clothing to Native American Indians in New Mexico; and we purchased a kidney machine for Sutter Memorial Hospital and Braille machines for the blind. We expanded our Camellia festival activities, held our famous Cadillac diner dances, where a lucky winner was awarded a new Cadillac. We help fund the Spacerium at the Sacramento Science Center, the Salvation Army gymnasium and the newly founded W.E.A.V.E. safe house.

In the 90's, our Green Team helped clean up the American River Parkway, We held our famous St. Nickolas Fairs to raise more money for the Family Support Agency, Sierra Adoption Agency, Child and Family Institute at Mustard Seed School for homeless kids; and we furnished classrooms at the New Helvetia-River Oaks Housing center and the Sacramento Youth Hostel. We did all this while continuing to award Scholarships to deserving college students and the Women's Opportunity Award (WOA) to at-risk female heads of household trying to advance their ed ucation for a better economic situation, and the Violet Richardson Award to deserving high school girls in recognition of their volunteer service.

I come from a land where one might have coffee for breakfast but every other time and/or event was accompanied by tea. Less so now I believe, since Starbucks has invaded everywhere, but certainly when we lived there and for years after. Good news, bad news, everything was washed down with tea.

My Mother truly believed that we got superior tea and second rate coffee while the US got inferior tea and first rate coffee. In all the years they lived down here my folks never bought an American teabag. But everything we received from family at Home came packed in teabags. Mom may have been correct or it may have been the differences in preparation.



Here "tea" can be anything: black tea, green tea, herbal tea. It is brewed so weakly that it hardly matters; it all tastes much alike and it looks like it was just mown in the back yard. There the pot is scalded, the tea, loose or bagged, goes in the pot and water is poured over when it is just off the boil. The pot sits on the stove until the tea is steeped to a nice mahogany color. Then usually it's cut with a nice dollop of milk or cream. They aren't fussy about a cup and saucer versus a mug usually, but you just can't hang a bag in a mug of tepid water and call it "tea". Real tea warms you up better on a cold day; it gives you a moment to absorb shocking news; it goes with secrets and good books; it's restorative and comforting.

I suppose that is why my Mom made me a cup of tea whenever I was sick. Sadly, I connected tea with being sick and therefore denied myself many cups of tea during the years. Finally, long after I was grown and gone, I returned to the fold and learned to enjoy a nice cup of tea. (That's usually a four word noun nice-cup-of-tea). I don't remember when I got over my bias, probably on one of the trips Home when I old enough to be offered tea and I didn't want to offend my aunties by turning it down. Later I started looking forward to a nice cup of tea at my folks' house.

When my Mom was older I discovered the East Coast catalog and imported King Cole tea, her favorite New Brunswick brand. Now, when I think about her or need a minute to gather my thoughts I have a cup of tea. I just did.
