The speaker is Amaya Weiss, Executive Community Director for Student Support Services at Sacramento City Unified School District. Amaya was the guest speaker at the recent Soroptimist District meeting. She shared how she'd been inspired to create Hope Closets at school campuses when she saw unmet needs among students and families, many of whom live in poverty. Amaya will share how by working with the larger school community and supporters, she was able to develop Hope Closets to provide food, clothing, toiletries, and school supplies.

November 16 Guest Speaker Brittanee Moreno – Teen Violence

Statistics show that 1.5 million high school girls and boys have been in an abusive relationship.

Our speaker of November 16^{th,} Brittanee Moreno, will tell us about the FLY (First Love Yourself) program, which includes Teen Dating Violence and Building Healthly Relationships.

Brittanee Moreno has been employed as a Tribal Advocate & Regional Coordinator with Inter-Tribal Council of California, Inc., (ITCC). A statewide tribal organization ITCC is comprised of 50 tribes and tribal

organizations. She is assigned to domestic violence related matters and community outreach.

Ms. Moreno works closely with tribal subject matter experts who have demonstrated a high level of functioning and success in their respective fields of work. In collaborative



effort, Ms. Moreno successfully helped in developing programs such as First Love Yourself, Elder Abuse Training, and Free and Empowered. These programs impact many communities throughout Northern California.

Ms. Moreno is affiliated with the Sherwood Valley Band of Pomo Indians and the Round Valley Indian Tribes. Prior to coming to Inter-Tribal Council of California, Inc., Ms. Moreno worked in the medical field for 5 years and attended Epic Bible College. She is well known for her willingness to serve the people in her community and her leadership qualities.



S.O.L.T - Soroptimist Orientation & Leadership Training Women, Water, & Leadership 2017-2019 S.I. Presidents' Appeal Submitted by the Membership Committee

S.I. President, Mariet Verhoff-Cohen, chose this topic for her two-year appeal back in 2017, and so far over \$60,000 has been raised. The hope is this appeal will support projects that educate, empower and enable women and girls to have the education, experience and capacity needed to manage water resources, and to gain careers in water-related professions.

At this time, there are two projects which this appeal has been supporting; one in Africa, and one in Europe. The Mwihoko Women's Group in Kenya is working to improve the economic and social livelihood of women, by teaching them better farming methods which utilize less water but will provide them with a sustainable livelihood. The project in WeWash, Bulgaria is reshaping the lives of unemployed and lowincome women and girls by increasing their employability in water related professions.

We should all plan ahead for next month's President's appeal which will occur in conjunction with the December 10th celebration of Human Right's Day. Water is a basic Human right. We should be prepared to help support this year's President's appeal.
