Guest Speaker for March 19 Submitted by Karen Smith

Our featured speaker on Friday, March 19th is Brigida Harrison, mother, coach and board member of Girls on the Run of Greater Sacramento.

Brigida's involvement in Girls on the Run (GOTR) began in 2013 when her daughter signed up for what she thought was just an after-school running program. As a lifelong runner, Brigida was excited to see her daughter's passion for the sport grow. She also realized that what her daughter got out of the program was so much more than running. Two years later, Brigida became a coach for Girls on the Run and saw first-hand the impact the program makes on young, adolescent girls. GOTR has been lifechanging not only for the girls but also for Brigida. She made a commitment to continue the mission of the program by joining the Board of Directors in 2018 as the Director of Business and Community Relations where she continues to serve today.

Girls on the Run is an after-school program that meets twice a week in small teams and teaches life skills through dynamic. interactive lessons and running games. The curriculum is taught by certified Girls on the Run coaches, like Brigida, and includes three parts: understanding ourselves, valuing relationships and teamwork and understanding how we connect with and shape the world at large. The program is a 10week program that culminates every year with a 5k run in May. Girls on the Run® is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization dedicated to creating a world where every girl knows and activates her limitless potential and is free to boldly pursue her dreams.

Aunt Bonnie Salutes Sacramentans! April 2016

At first I didn't notice anything unusual about the well-dressed woman coming out of the office building I was entering. Then I saw her touch her index finger to a spot over her upper lip and beneath her nose. It was fleeting, almost furtive, and then it was gone – an almost imperceptible, reflexive movement. I didn't give it much notice.

Soon after, an up-and-coming young business type was striding quickly from his car to a building in the purposeful way young men of that type are wont to do. Just before he went inside he made a quick back-and-forth motion to the spot where his mustache would have been in the 70's. He did it quickly, naturally, as men from another time might have doffed their hats to ladies. But it was definitely the same signal.



followed suit and a child approximated the same signal, less adroitly but much more enthusiastically, using every part from his fingertip to his elbow.

Then, like a bolt, it hit me. I was witnessing the annual Sacramento Spring Salute. That hasty effort to scratch the itch and simultaneously check for dampness that comes over us every year at this time. Amidst the cycles of the warming and the cooling, the

Carnival in Germany By Wendy Haydon-Schneider

Helau......Helau!!* That is what we say during Carnival Season, and we wave our hand in a big "hi" motion as we say it!¹ Yes, Germans consider Carnival to be the "fünfte Jahrezeit" (fifth season) of the year! It officially begins each year on November 11th at 11:11 a.m.

We just finished with Carnival Season at 11:59 p.m. on February 16th! Then Lent began on February 17th with "Ashermittwoch" (Ash Wednesday).

You are probably aware of Carnival in Rio de Janeiro (Carnaval do Rio de Janeiro) and Mardi Gras in New Orleans. They are all similar celebrations, and are celebrated around the globe, largely concentrated in Europe, South America (Brazil and Mexico) and in New Orleans, Louisiana and Mobile, Alabama. Some countries in Asia, especially around the Pacific region, also celebrate a local version of carnival.

What is Carnival in Germany? It is the time of year where Germans are allowed to lose control (and it lasts several months – haha!). There are parades, costumes, parties, balls, music, and beer during this time. In some cities, this celebration is the biggest of the year (bigger than Christmas and New Years Eve).

Depending on where you are in Germany, you might not notice people celebrating Carnival. In Berlin, for example, you need to look hard for Carnival celebrations. In other regions, Carnival plays a significant role in the culture. In the south, the towns close to the Black Forest celebrate Carnival more traditionally, using this time to reflect on the simple life and to keep old traditions alive.

¹ Calling out 'Helau' is a regional custom. In other areas of Germany, they use other greetings.

There are also different names for Carnival; the three most common names for Carnival in Germany are Karneval, Fastnacht, and Fasching. Here is a map showing various names for Carnival!

Köln (Cologne) has the biggest carnival celebration in Germany, followed by Dusseldorf and Mainz (I lived in Mainz for 6+ years!). The celebrations in these big cities are full of colorful costumes, a lot of alcohol, joyful songs, and crazy parties.

Each region in Germany has its local Carnival songs, which are played over and over and over again at any party. The lyrics are either in the regional dialect or in standard German and mostly talk about the region from where



the song comes from. The music is intended to include the crowds to sing along, sway, or dance, and the lyrics are very easy to sing along, as they involve repetitive and simple chants.

Carnival, as many European traditions, has religious roots. It is the last chance to get wild before Lent. Although the origins of Carnival who celebrate it are not religious. The most popular theory about the origins of carnival in Germany goes back to pagan times. Before Catholicism arrived in Germany, there were multiple spring festivals to celebrate the end of winter. Some festivities would require people to wear scary masks to drive out the evil spirits and welcome a good crop season. Others, like the people along the Rhine, would have a festival in honor of their wine god Dionysus. When Christianity arrived in Germany, the Catholic church saw these festivities as a perfect celebration before Lent. So, it introduced the term Carnival, which has Latin roots (Carne Vale).

have a religious background, most Germans

As years went by, Carnival was seen as the perfect 'last party' before Lent's regulations would kick in. During this period, there was a sense of equality of classes. Poor and rich people were able to mix. It was easy to do it because everyone used imaginative masks and costumes to hide their identity. The common people would also mock the political authorities through humorous and satirical speeches. These performances were also done with costumes and masks to avoid the participants to be recognized and later punished by the authorities.

The Carnival celebrated in Germany today is a mix of all of these things: a celebration before Lent with a lot of alcohol, funny costumes, and satirical speeches and parades.

The important dates for Carnival in Germany are:

November 11th – the start of the Carnival Season – it's a day to celebrate! Weiberfastnacht² (Fat Thursday) – six days before Ash Wednesday

Carnival weekend – smaller celebrations continue Friday, Saturday, and Sunday before Ash Wednesday – parties on Friday and Saturday evenings, and street parties and neighborhood parades on Sunday

Rosenmontag (Rose Monday) – big parades in cities happen then – having

² Weiberfastnacht means Women's Carnival – it begins at 11:11 on Fat Thursday (the Thursday before Ash Wednesday). It is the beginning of the six-day peak of the Carnival Season. Remnants of the original purpose are that women are allowed to cut off men's ties and to kiss (on the cheek) whomever they want.

imaginative floats, and it is common to see satirical ones mocking the German and US government – each float has lively music and people on the floats throw candies and other goodies to the people watching on the sidelines. Parade watchers wear very creative and colorful costumes! I love going to this parade!

Faschingsdienstag (Shrove Tuesday) – while many of the people who participated in the Carnival celebration might be recovering from a hangover on this day, others will attend one last celebration. Carnival ends at 11:59 p.m.!

In between the big parties of November 11th and Fat Thursday, there are many smaller and more traditional events happening in all the villages that celebrate Carnival. Germans love to have associations for everything, and yes, there are Carnival Associations who regulate the events! As the saying goes, what happens in Carnival stays in Carnival!

My friends, Chris and Maria, and I in 2019 out and about in Mainz on Weiberfastnacht,* in costume – I was very comfy in PJs and bathrobe!



Here are some Mainz parade shots – bands, floats, various groups in costumes! Some floats making political statements or making fun of politicians.





This year, due to COVID-19 (we have been in lockdown since November 2, 2020 and will remain so likely throughout March 2021), there were no parades, parties, gatherings, balls, or bar hopping. On the Carnival weekend before Ash Wednesday, there were, however, several Carnival programs on TV that we watched! Some were recordings of past Carnival shows (where the audience is packed in the room and dancers or comedians or storytellers perform on a stage), and one show was 2021 live (with very very few in the audience to allow for social distancing)! We had on Carnival hats and danced, ate our Berliners, and we celebrated at home. Here is a photo of our Berliners: they are a donut-sized pastry only available during Carnival Season – they are jelly-filled, very delicious!



Here are some photos that I took of the Carnival programs on TV – a small procession through the streets of Mainz with the "Big Heads" that are known to Mainz. Also, one of a live 2021 Carnival show that was in Mainz – the people sitting up at the 'head table' were appropriately social-distanced, shown with mannequins between them!



Here is a photo of a children's Carnival program – it was in Cologne and was televised.

The store is open from February 19 – March 19th. Items ordered by the last day will be received before Easter. Please feel free to forward to friends and family!


