Presidents' Corner By Phyllis McMaster Moist and Cathy Diepenbrock

War is not gender-neutral. In case of armed conflict, women suffer disproportionately.

Women rarely seek war but are the most affected by war. In peace talks, they are usually absent, if not excluded.

The conflict in Ukraine cannot leave us silent. We fear for the health and well-being of millions of women and girls who may suffer injury, loss of their homes and their jobs, displacement, loss of

schooling, rape, and death. Women are much more vulnerable to war crimes than men.

We call upon the states to fully respect the human rights of all women and girls in Ukraine as stated in the Convention on Human Rights of the

Council of Europe to which all Council of Europe member states agreed to adhere, including Russia and Ukraine.

We also urge all European countries to welcome citizens of Ukraine who flee the zone of combat



and seek safety. Women and girls should receive special protection due to their greater vulnerability.

Our organization, Soroptimist International of Europe, is present in most European countries, including Russia and Ukraine. We work on projects educating, empowering, and enabling women and girls – please join us in helping women in warzone.

Our newsletter this month contains the letter sent to Cathy and I (and to all of us) from Carolyn Roberts, current President of the Salt Lake City club, giving us an update on our very own Georgia and how thrilled they are to have her! (Of course, they are!)

Coincidentally, I just discovered that I have a personal, historical link to Soroptimists International of Vallejo, through some family tree and ancestry work that I have been doing through Ancestry.com. When Nancy Wolford Landers asked me to join Soroptimists, I already knew that my father's mother had been a member, as my mother had mentioned it (this grandmother died when I was 7), but after finding her obituary in the Ancestry.com archives, I discovered that Henrietta McMaster Wilson had been President of the Vallejo club. I contacted this club and their current President, Josette Lacey, called me back to tell me that Nana Pet (as we called her) was President in 1945-1946. This would have been immediately after my father would have come home from Okinawa, a Marine Raider wounded in World War II on Okinawa in April 1945. Nana Pet passed away in 1955, but apparently there is a section of the Vallejo City History Museum that is about Soroptimists and more information about her may be there. I will keep you posted. her.

Aunt Bonnie - I Will Curate No More Forever By Bonnie Coleman

I have been an admirer of Chief Joseph of the Nez Perce tribe since I first heard his story. He was not a military genius; he was the chief of an Oregon Indian tribe who tried to take his remaining people the few miles into Canada where they wouldn't to be pursued by the US Army. Like most of the Indian Chiefs we have records of, he was a resolute, honest, man who attempted to negotiate with a capricious US Army/Government that was treading an evermoving line between the demands of a burgeoning population of immigrants and an ever-shifting political landscape. He traveled from his homeland to within 40 miles of the Canadian border in a series of brilliant tactical moves before being captured, transported, and relocated to an inhospitable and unfamiliar land in Oklahoma, where he and most of his followers died. Another chapter of our country's history we are not eager to remember.

This concludes the memorial paragraph of a remarkable man in a dispiriting situation against hopeless odds who continued to do the Right Thing until there were no more moves to make. It bears little on the slight situation we will now pursue. I am just drawn to thinking about Chief Joseph and what might have happened if the US Army could have left him alone to cross the border into Canada. Perhaps the brave people of the Ukraine brought it to mind. Hard to say what brings things to this mind.

I am old now. Sometimes it's fun. I grew up in a time in which we did things; we refused to do other things; whatever. We didn't curate anything unless we ran a museum. Now people curate everything that isn't, well, I don't know where they will stop until we are curating one another. It sounds to me more like what one would do to a ham and even then, one would be wrong. But I digress. Again. Actually, to digress I would have had to set a topic, which I have yet to do. Well better late than never. Let's think about our current board.

Like Chief Joseph they are honest, resolute people trying to do the Right Thing against unthinkable circumstances they never imagined, much less signed up for, in a troubled time in which it is almost impossible to rely on the past or predict the future for guidance on how to sustain and grow our little tribe. And yet, they have tried throughout the year to keep us focused on our mission, provide some productive projects, and give some opportunities for joy in this bleak time. They deserve some recognition and respect

for continuing the good fight to the end. Yeah, Board members! And yeah, readers who resolutely pursued this issue in search of a topic to the bitter end. Yeah You!

Soroptimists (and Others!) to the Aid in Ukraine By Wendy Haydon-Schneider

I have been feeling antsy, not knowing what to do to help the people of Ukraine. I have seen that there are groups here in Germany who are collecting donated items and driving them to the border with Poland. In fact, a friend of mine named Chris delivered a van full of donated items. Here's a photo of her very full van – she drove to the city of Darmstadt in Germany, where a semi-truck was waiting to be filled before departing for Poland!



There are also websites that have been set up here where you can register with them that you have a room, or rooms, available and are willing to host the women and children who are fleeing Ukraine.

Then I saw that Eva Skårner, a Soroptimist friend from the Malmö Soroptimistklubb in Sweden, who I am connected with on Facebook. Her club is holding a fundraiser to raise money to aid Ukraine's people. The fundraiser started the last weekend in February and is continuing!! Eva says, "Thank you to all you generous people who donated to our fundraiser this weekend. 20,000 has been sent to our sister club at the Ukrainian border. They are making an emergency effort to help all the refugees coming from Eastern Ukraine. The fundraiser continues and we gratefully receive all help. 
