Guest Speaker at Business Meeting by Idelle Claypool

We are excited to have Lisa Mangiafico of SIA as a guest speaker at our Business meeting on February 3rd. She will give a presentation on Soroptimst's Early Program Legacy. Lisa Mangiafico is the Associate Senior Director for Records and Risk Management at SIA headquarters. She was hired by SIA as our archivist and records manager in 1993, in anticipation of the organization's 75th anniversary in 1996 to create our federation archives. Since then Lisa has taken on a number of roles at headquarters, and has recently taken on risk management as one of the operational areas she oversees, in addition to records, and governance. Prior to joining SIA's staff, she worked for the

General Federation of Women's Clubs as the coordinator of the Women's History and Resource Center in Washington, DC.



Lisa has graduate degrees in history and library/information science. She is a member of the Mid-Atlantic Regional Archives Conference, serving as its presiding officer from 2003 to 2005, among numerous appointed and elected board positions. Lisa is also a long-time member of the Society of American Archivists and was elected to its board for 2013-2016. In 2020, Lisa was inducted as a Fellow of the society. She currently serves as the President of the Society of American Archivists Foundation Board. Lisa served on the New Jersey State Historical Records Advisory Board from

2004-2017 and is a member of the Cherry Hill Historical Commission.

Why do we need a botanical garden in Sacramento?



Member Spotlight – Barbara Coulam

While we at SIS are getting ready to celebrate our 100th year, it won't be long before we celebrate the 40th year of membership for Barbara Coulam, who joined SIS in 1984. In the earlier years of SIS, only one person from an employer or profession was invited to join. Barbara's boss and mentor at SMUD, Maxine Gentis, was already a member but once the rules changed, Maxine invited Barbara to apply for membership. Thank goodness for the rule change!

At SMUD, Barbara filled a variety of roles including home economics and energy conservation. She developed the first home energy workshop in Sacramento where she and her colleagues would throw parties (like Tupperware parties) in people's homes. The homeowner invited friends and they would show them energy conservation methods from that time. They offered the homeowner a conservation examination (home energy audit) as a reward and special gifts like weather stripping and special plugs. Between the three of them, they did over 200 parties. This was early in the days of thinking about energy conservation, and many of the ideas were new. While Barbara was telling me about this, I couldn't help but think about that ride at Disneyland sponsored by GE...(Sing along with me....) "It's a great big beautiful tomorrow" where you'd ride around and see the homes become more and more modern and energy efficient.

Barbara also ran cooking schools as a SMUD home economist and over the years, she wore a variety of other hats during her time at SMUD. She was so good at her job that it took three tries to finally retire completely in 1989. They kept luring her back.

Barbara joined SIS for the camaraderie and company, and she has also enjoyed participating in projects and committees to empower women and girls. When she joined, SIS focused on community projects and she has since learned so much about the needs of women and girls and the ways in which Soroptimist supports them across the globe. She especially enjoyed the days of the Christmas boutiques where committees would get together to make wreaths, ornaments, home gnomes and other holiday items. The members would meet every few weeks to create items. The culminating event was a large luncheon and silent auction. Kiosks and tables were set up to display items for sale to raise funds. Once inexpensive holiday items started coming in from outside the US, the boutiques were no longer held, but she has fond memories of those days.

Barbara has worked on many committees over the years and has enjoyed helping out with the newsletter, attendance and hospitality. She was one of the first to own a home computer and she had skills that others didn't have then. She designed the beloved little roster book, and she works hard to put that out for us every year and keep all of the membership records up to date. Barbara also designs and prints many of the certificates, programs and signage that we need for various events.

Her family moved to Sacramento in 1943 and since they arrived at night, she couldn't see much. She still remembers going outside in the morning and being stunned by the number of trees here. City of Trees, indeed! After attending Mills College, she married Bob. Bob and Barbara were married for almost 64 years before he passed away a few years ago, and they had one son, Barry, who is deceased. Barbara is grateful for wonderful neighbors and SIS friends who look out for her and help her out.

We are so lucky to Barbara as a longtime and dedicated member of SIS.
