In Search of Blanche Edgar / Shirely Godfrey Recommendations:

Some examples of SIS Balance Edgar/ Shirley Godfrey projects funded have included:

- materials for the Old Schoolhouse Museum in Old Sacramento;
- renovation of the Clunie Clubhouse in McKinley Park;
- fencing and irrigation system for a community garden in Del Paso Heights;
- a meeting room in the Teichert Boys and Girls Club at 12th & G Streets;
- a "ball wall" at a Title I school;
- a kitchen for a safe house at "My Sister's House" (a domestic violence shelter);
- a mini-van for W.E.A.V.E. (Women Escaping a Violent Environment)

Who are / were Blanche Edgar and Shirley Godfrey?

Blanche Edgar Girot: Over the years, many prominent members of the community have been a part of SIS. However, one very noteworthy citizen was Blanche Edgar Girot. Blanche was president of SIS in 1930, but her contributions to our club touch SIS and the community to this day. She chartered 104 clubs throughout the world. Her motto was "Attendance is the price of membership and service is the means of enjoyment of that membership." She gifted some land to SIS in 1965 and the proceeds of the sale have allowed SIS to fund the construction and current upkeep of the School House in Old Sacramento, the Pirate Ship in Fairy Tale Town, and the Arts and Crafts Room at the Thomas P. Raley Boys and Girls Club to name a few.

Shirley E. Godfrey: (9/7/1920-4/25/2002). Shirley was the absolute model of a true and devoted Soroptimist. She began as a "Venture Girl" around 1946 and became a Soroptimist in 1957 when she joined SIS. She became president of SIS in 1969. Shirley retired from the Sacramento County Superior Court as court clerk to set aside enough time in her life to become the second Governor of the newly formed Sierra Nevada Region from 1978 to 1980. Prior to that time, she served as Secretary on the Board of Directors for the Southwestern Region. Shirley left a large portion of her estate to SIS when she passed away in 2002. The funds are used variously to pay for "concrete" projects and scholarships for young and re-entry women.

Live Your Dream Awards- March 2024 By Pat McConahay

"I am very grateful for this award as it will help me realize my dream to become a case manager in a hospice facility," said Shanita Morris, one of four recipients of SIS's 2024 "Live Your Dream" award. The single mother of five wrote in her application, "While I was definitely born into a more difficult life, with all of its trials and tribulations, my vision for my children has made me want to change this cycle of dysfunction for them." Shanita is earning an AA in Human Resources with a goal of becoming a case manager in a hospice facility.

Soroptimist's Live Your Dream Award, founded in 1972, is a unique education award for women who are the primary financial support for their families. More than half of the recipients are survivors of domestic violence, trafficking, or sexual assault. They may use the cash award to offset any costs associated with their efforts to get a higher education. That includes books, childcare, tuition, and transportation.

Another recipient, Kayla Burleson-Nelson, said "There are many times I wanted to give up, quit school and quit life. I am so overwhelmed with everything, but I just pray about it and look at my children and say I have come too far to give up." Kayla is earning her AA in Early Childhood Education and works full time at a child development center.

On March 15, 2024, Kayla and Shanita were presented with Live Your Dream Awards along with two others: Evangeline Ogbu who is studying speech pathology and Angelica Martinez, a library assistant, who is taking classes to improve her skills as a library assistant.

SIS distributes an average of \$10,000 a year for the Live Your Dream awards.
